She really took the time to understand our family dynamic, to understand the auditory environment in which Macy was living and experiencing her day to day.

The coaching I received as a parent to be so intentional in the hours and the days and the moments that we weren't actually with our early interventionist, to make it a lifestyle, were so critical to really inculcate it as something for Macy that was beyond just an hour in the week when we went and sat and worked through listening skills with an early interventionist.

It was so critical as a family and for Macy to know that this was something that we were going to do all the time, every day, and the coaching that we received, the absolute understanding that our early interventionist brought to the table about our family life, about the environment of our home, about our schedule, all of those things, it was such a partnership.
